Most recently, I spent six years working for One Acre Fund as their Director of Innovations for Kenya. As director, I led a multinational team of 100+ staff, and led country-wide strategy, expansion and trial implementation of a diverse range of research and design portfolios, including health and nutrition.

My experiences have given me a multifaceted and multicultural understanding of health and illness that span the academic, private, public, and not-for-profit spheres. My experiences have also taught me to be an effective communicator and collaborator in intercultural contexts that are often poorly resourced and rapidly changing. As such, I feel confident working in large, diverse teams that must work quickly to come to consensus and collaboration.
